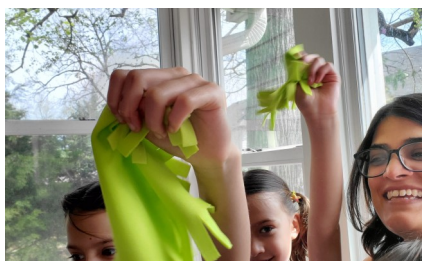

How to Prepare for Worshipping Online

The staff of Trinity Presbyterian Church is working hard to bring the best possible worship experiences to the Trinity Church community during the COVID-19 crisis. We are having to learn brand new skills, re-think elements of the service, find creative spaces to use for different parts of worship, and work on a totally different schedule since we film the parts of worship early in the week. We are also striving to incorporate different types of music in ways that feel organic to the theme of the service and setting of worship, so we don't get to use everything we film week to week. I'm sharing a little bit about how we are working as a staff in order to highlight some of the ways we are sharing worship@home so you can tailor the experience for your household.

1. Recognizing that we cannot include all the musical offerings in the worship video each week, we have created an extra music folder that is populated each week with all the music recorded by our Trinity staff musicians and other musicians. These pieces remain in the folder, so you can go there to find organ music, piano music, youth brass music, or contemporary music any time.
2. We are producing separate children's worship videos. This is enabling us to spend a little more time than we would be able to devote to the children's sermon in a regular worship service. We are telling engaging stories, including music most weeks, and hoping to make the children's worship video engaging for all ages.
3. We are also including where possible additional activities for children. Look for coloring pages, games, and the children's bulletins for younger and older children.
4. We are continuing to include the Personal Journey page in the bulletin each week to encourage conversation around the scripture readings and sermon topics. There are resources there for all ages from the youngest Trinity members on up. This is a great time to try it!

For Congregants: You Might Want to Change the Way You Listen

Worshiping on-line is a change for the staff, but also a huge change for the congregation. In order to make the experience as meaningful as possible, I encourage you to change the way you listen around the following six considerations.

Prepare

Look over the worship bulletin for anything you need to prepare ahead of time (candle, communion elements, etc.). If you would like to start with a specific type of music, go to the extra music folder and find something that will help prepare your heart for worship.

Pray

Come to the time of worship with an attitude of prayer. Read over the prayer list for new and continuing joys and concerns. Pray silently or out loud if there are others gathering with you. Pray that God will speak through the Word that is communicated.

Focus

This means that you give full attention to the time of worship. Turn off your cell phone. Don't just watch, as if you want to be entertained, but give your attention to what's being said and how it's being said. What is the overall message being communicated?

Interact

Follow the liturgy. Say the words. If you like to sing, belt out the hymns. Engage.

For some, note taking, prayer-request-texting, or even drawing a picture representing what is being said will help you to be present with the preacher and the message.

View What's Happening as a Conversation

Consider the words from the preacher as a conversation with you. This will help you to focus and interact with what the preacher is saying. Jot down questions or comments to send to the pastor. Such engagement reinforces a sense of presence for the listener—and the presence the preacher intends to communicate.

Share

If you find Trinity's worship service inspiring, share it with others. One of the advantages of on-line worship is the ability to invite someone to check out Trinity through this format.

Finally, let us know how we are doing. You can post a picture of your online worship experience, leave a message on the Trinity page under the worship posting, or send a private e-mail or message to the church office or a specific staff member.

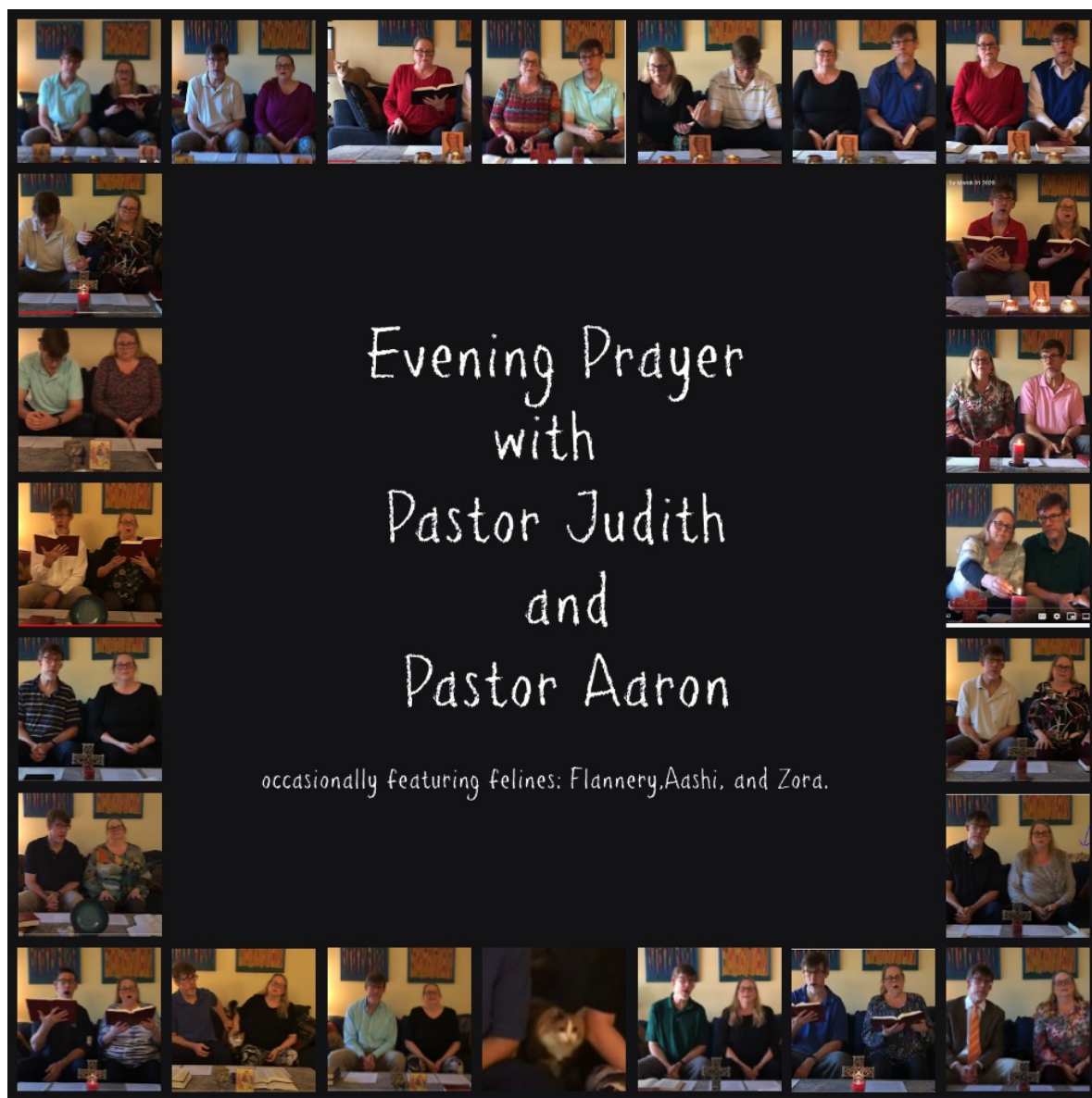

Why Evening Prayer (hint: it is not just a prayer)

Pastor Judith and Pastor Aaron share an evening prayer each night about 7:30 p.m. on social media and the webpage. We invite you to try it out. This is not just a typical prayer; it has many elements to it so you can enjoy the whole thing or you can choose to listen to the music or just the scriptures. It is a wonderful change to inject a peaceful 15 minutes into your day or evening. We begin with candle lighting, then a song, scripture reading, a short discussion of how the scripture relates to the day's prayer, followed by a prayer. If there is time it ends with a song and benediction. We list the prayer topics on [the webpage](#) if you are in need of a specific prayer topic. Topics have included: anxiety, springtime, gratitude, surrender, as well as different ways of praying, like an encircling prayer. The Personal Journey can be a conversation starter or internal reflection. It starts with a scripture to read followed by questions to reflect as well as a section for families. Reflection Questions for Adults and Youth [Ezekiel 37:1-14](#)

In response to God's question "Can these bones live?" Ezekiel replies "You alone know"
Why does God ask a question if God already knows the answer?
Why do you think Ezekiel won't say one way or the other?

Care for Creation: We are seeing some amazing things in creation right now as humans have slowed down their activity in reaction to the COVID-19 pandemic. What are you noticing or reading about? How does it change the way you feel about being part of God's creation?

Practicing Faith: What is giving you hope right now? What can you do to give other people hope in this difficult time?

Blessing for the Week (Jan Richardson)

That the holy will haunt you.
That the terrain of your days will give way to God.
Each moment. Each step. Each circling and turning.
Every breath an opening to new creation.

With Young Children and all ages A Story and a Game

Begin by gathering together as a household and lighting a candle. Are there any memories from the day you want to share? Anything you need to talk about or pray about?

In today's Bible story there was a prophet named Ezekiel (practice saying the name together). A prophet is someone who speaks for God. Ezekiel listened to God and then told the people what God wanted them to know. The people were very sad because they were far away from home and didn't know if they would ever get to go back. They were so sad that they felt all dried up. They thought God had forgotten about them. Ezekiel was sad too. God spoke to Ezekiel and said, "Let me show you something." He took Ezekiel to a place where a lot of old dry bones were lying on the ground. He said to Ezekiel, "Can these bones live?" Ezekiel said, "I don't know, God. Only you know." Then God asked Ezekiel to talk to the bones and tell them to get up and live again. When Ezekiel talked to the bones, they rattled and came back together. Then God put new bodies on the bones and breathed on them and they began to walk around. God wanted Ezekiel to know that even though the people felt like dry bones, God had not forgotten them. God's Spirit gives us hope when we are going through hard times and reminds us that we are loved.

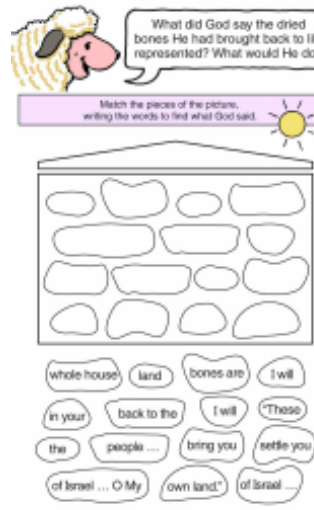
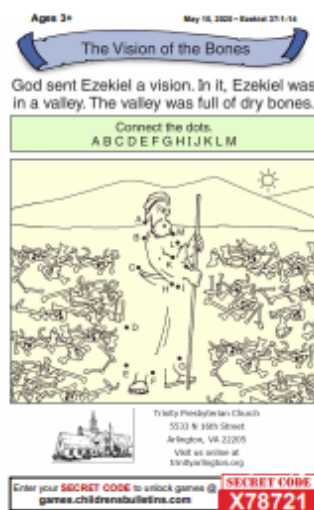
DRY BONES GAME: Designate someone to be Ezekiel. Other family members move around in a designated area until Ezekiel says, FREEZE DRY BONES! And immediately everyone stops and freezes until Ezekiel says, "COME ALIVE, BONES!" After a few moments, Ezekiel commands again, FREEZE DRY BONES! Let everyone who wants to lead take the part of Ezekiel. Ezekiel can offer different instructions, such as, DANCE, DRY BONES! or DO JUMPING JACKS, DRY BONES!

Dear God, we thank you for this hopeful story and for the way our bodies can move. Amen.

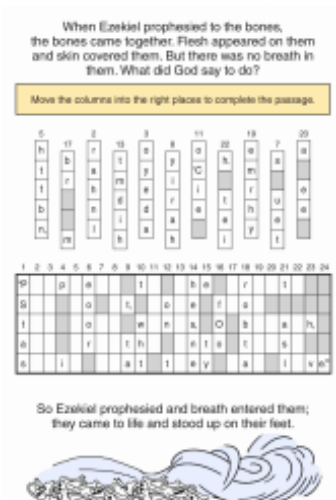
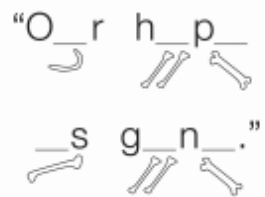
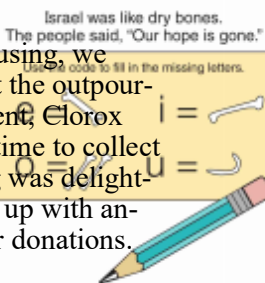

During the Covid-19 crisis, we are spending more time than usual surrounded by our families. The discussions will be for all of us, because we are all in relationships.

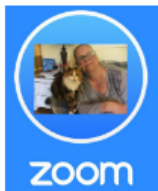
We would like to discuss the lessons in "Married to Distraction." In their book, "[Married to Distraction](#)," Edward and Sue George Hallowell say there are five steps to happy in relationships: 1) Attention 2) Time 3) Empathy 4) Connection 5) Play. You would think these steps would be easy. In fact, Distraction abounds! We are still pulled away from relationships by the same things: devices, work demands, family logistics, news, social media, and online access to EVERYTHING. Add the generalized fear and fatigue caused by the crisis we are in and we need this discussion more than ever.

Focusing on the lessons, we will spend 6 weeks, beginning April 19 from 10-11 a.m. talking together about how to improve our significant relationships in ways that will outlast Covid-19. Ways to Serve

In addition to reaching out to friends, family, and neighbors with cards, calls, and video chats, here are some local organizations that need your help. We want you to be aware of their needs, both monetary and in terms of physical volunteers, but please consider those in your household who are at greater risk from COVID19 and act accordingly. Many of these needs can be acted on right from the safety of your home if you need to take strict precautions because of your own health or the health of someone in your home.

Million Mask Challenge provides face masks to first responders, healthcare workers and others on the front lines of the Covid-19 crisis in our community. They are in great need of volunteers to sew, drive, and provide other support. "Sew Ready Kits" make it easy to participate. [Go to their website](#) to learn how you can get involved. AFAC: Arlington Food Assistance Center Since 1988, the Arlington Food Assistance Center remains dedicated to its simple but critical mission of obtaining and distributing groceries, directly and free of charge, to people living in Arlington, VA, who cannot afford to purchase enough food to meet their basic needs. AFAC is still based on referrals but are moving to 6 month eligibility to lessen paperwork and increase service. Pastor Judith was on a video call with AFAC where they outlined the extraordinary precautions they are taking to keep the volunteers safe. For example, marking out spaces on the floor that are 6 feet apart, wiping down the workspaces every hour. They also have expanded into the warehouse next door for more packing space so people can be physically distanced. New Hope Housing Since 1978 New Hope Housing has been providing a comprehensive, innovative array of services to homeless families and single adults. New Hope Housing is the oldest and largest provider of shelter beds in northern Virginia. They are accepting donations and also items on their Amazon wish list. (**<http://a.co/ce6ElxS>**). The donations that were given to Trinity as part of the Shoebox project have been donated to New Hope Housing.

THRIVE Arlington Thrive is the only organization in Arlington County, Virginia that provides same-day, emergency financial assistance to County residents who experience sudden financial crisis such as temporary unemployment or illness. Arlington Free Clinic Arlington Free Clinic provides free, high-quality healthcare to low-income, uninsured Arlington County adults through the generosity of donors and volunteers. You can donate monetarily here: **<https://www.arlingtonfreeclinic.org/>**

The Food Bank at Our Lady Queen of Peace does not require referrals and have seen a sharp rise in needs. This is where a family that does not have a social worker through DHS can get food assistance. Rent Assistance

Rent Assistance Success

A group of local churches have banded together to help raise \$250,000 to pay rent for 250 families in need during the economic downturn.

Pastor David Hanke of Restoration Anglican Church helped organize the program, called The Church at Work in Arlington. On Thursday, he told WUSA9 that everything began when an Arlington County social worker came forward with the idea. "What emerged was, if we were to help with rent, that would free up some dollars," the pastor said. "We had never done something like this before but there was an opportunity for us to serve people who are experiencing real needs."

Nine other churches joined in with Restoration Anglican. The program provided 250 families with rent by connecting donors with the families' landlords. According to Pastor Hanke, the support quickly gained momentum. "I was pretty astounded by how quickly people responded," he said. "We had \$100,000 within two weeks right before Easter and then another \$100,000 came in right after."

For the families receiving the help, Hanke said the support was going a long way.

"For those who had no work-from-home option, income was immediately not an option," he said. "We really saw it as stepping into a moment of need that emerged."

Each family went through a vetting process before receiving the aid, with social services proving a helping hand in Arlington.

"We had folks who were in the system, who were known by social workers and who were saying this is a real need to give," he said. With the economy still facing some concerns, the pastor said the donation effort helped send a powerful message. "I think what I've noticed is there is a real desire to be generous and to help," he said. "At this particular moment there is a real desire for partnership and for moments of grace."

Pastor Hanke told WUSA that the rent program will go until at least the end of June.

Session Highlights

Session Highlights for April 2020

Following are highlights of the session's regular monthly meeting, held April 14. For more information, touch base with Pastor Judith, Clerk Jim Dykstra or any session member:

- Led by Pastor Judith, session had an extended discussion of the Coronavirus situation and Trinity's response to it. Session approved a motion extending the suspension of worship services and other activities at Trinity until June 10, consistent with restrictions put in place by Virginia Governor Ralph Northam, with the understanding session will reassess the situation based on guidance from National Capital Presbytery and consideration of the situation related to the Coronavirus pandemic. Video services provided online have been well received. Members are being kept informed through the weekly e-news, and a postcard may be sent to members providing details on changes in operations and providing a link to the Trinity website. Pastor Judith praised the staff for their efforts during the pandemic.
- Rev. Judith reported that she had spoken with officials at the Virginia Hospital Center, offering use of the church parking lot and facilities, pending satisfactory consideration of insurance issues, and was told that Trinity will be added to VHC's list of those volunteering such assistance should the need arise.
- Treasurer Carol Hart reported that Trinity's financial situation through March is good, but she anticipated that the situation will look different in April as a result of the Coronavirus pandemic. With services being held virtually, there are no loose offerings, and with the building closed, there are no building use revenues through the period of the Coronavirus restrictions, anticipated to be a number of months.
- Session discussed the upcoming session retreat, scheduled to be held at the church on the weekend of May 15-16. It will either need to be held remotely on those days or rescheduled for a later date.
- The Vacation Bible School planning group will hold a meeting on April 17 to discuss options for VBS, currently scheduled for June 22-26. Because of the Coronavirus pandemic, it may not be able to be held in person. Among options to be considered is to conduct VBS online via Zoom or another platform. The planning group will meet with the Christian Education Ministry on April 22 to discuss its recommendation.
- Trinity has been certified as a First Yea Earth Care Congregation for 2020 by the Presbyterian Church (USA)'s Presbyterian Hunger Program through February 2021.
- Three new trees were added on Trinity's grounds in early April.
- A motion from the Georgie Wade Scholarship Review Committee was approved to make an exception to the resolution establishing the scholarship fund to provide an additional 2020-2021 scholarship to a qualified applicant, for a total of three.
- Training for incoming elders will probably be done virtually via Zoom because of the Coronavirus pandemic and restrictions in place in response to it. Because of the pandemic, ordination and installation of elders for the class of 2023 will likely be done remotely, with a tentative date of Sunday, May 31.
- The staff review process is being developed. Pastor Judith will consult with the Administration Ministry to determine how best to proceed in light of the Coronavirus pandemic and restrictions in place to respond to it.
- Dates for summer worship will be from Memorial Day Sunday to Labor Day Sunday, contingent on when restrictions put in place in response to the Coronavirus pandemic are lifted and regular services can resume.
- Session continued discussion of ministry chair terms. The Christian Education and Nurture Ministry chair is vacant.
- The Mission and Service Ministry said funds are being reallocated to provide assistance to those sewing protective masks as part of the Million Mask Challenge in response to the Coronavirus pandemic.
- The Outreach Ministry said the concern scheduled to be held in the Trinity parking lot on May 2 has been postponed because of the pandemic and will be rescheduled for a later date.
- The Pastoral Care Ministry reported that a memorial service for longtime Trinity member Milly Martin was held at 11 a.m. on Monday, March 16.
- The Worship and Music Ministry said efforts continue to move forward on purchase of the new audio visual system for the sanctuary.

A Financial Update

Many church members are asking how we are doing financially during the COVID-19 restriction. Trinity's finance ministry met recently, and we can share the following updates with you.

- Our revenues since the end of March are down significantly. Not worshipping at the church is one factor, but another is that we are not able to rent out the gym or other parts of the building, which usually generates regular income for the church.
- We are not experiencing an immediate financial crisis at Trinity. Due to budget surpluses the past several years, we currently have enough reserves to pay our bills for the next several months.
- We are continuing to pay all staff, including childcare workers, and have applied for the Paycheck Protection Program loan to help with payroll costs.
- We are stepping up as a church in this crisis and will continue to do so. The Mission and Service Ministry (MSM) has increased support for local agencies assisting folks impacted by COVID-19 and is also supporting the Million Mask Challenge by funding supplies for the Trinity members who are sewing masks for use by non-medical assistance providers. As our outreach continues, we will keep you aware of what the church is doing through the weekly worship services.

If you are in a financial position to do so, we encourage you to give to Trinity via checks, [the website](#) or stock donations. Our church is in a strong position to weather this storm and, with your continued support, we can be a source of assistance for those who have been most deeply affected by the COVID-19 pandemic. Thank you for the ways you are responding individually to the needs of those around you and for your continued support of Trinity.

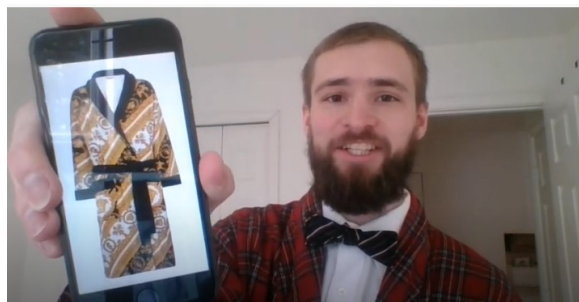
Every Sunday Night - 7:7
