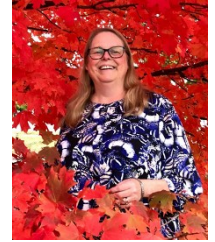
Winter at Trinity

The Pastor's Pen



Dear Trinity Members and Friends,

It is hard to believe that 8 years have passed since Aaron and I walked the Camino de Santiago on our last sabbatical (2015), a journey that included both of our girls and 500 miles of walking. We are excited to be planning for a sabbatical this summer (May 28 – August 27), when we plan to travel across the United States, beginning with a 10-day road trip including Aaron's father, brother, and sister-in-law. The purpose of this leg of the journey is to leave Aaron's mother's ashes in two places that were very important to her -Two Lights, Maine, and Harvard, Illinois. After we depart from Aaron's family in Chicago, we will head south then west, with our first main stop at Ghost Ranch, NM. From there we will continue west, then up the Pacific Coast, and then across the Northern U.S. on our way back. Our stops will include cities, beaches, lakes, and at least ten national parks.

I plan to write a travel blog highlighting the history of indigenous peoples in each place we visit. This is something that has been of great interest to me since childhood. With the recent national interest in U.S. history with regards to indigenous peoples and lands, I hope to learn and share in each place we visit and gain a richer understanding of Native American spirituality. In addition to the words, we'll also be sharing images of our travels each day posted to social media and on our respective blogs.

Along the way, will be visiting different churches for Sunday morning worship. The combination of connecting with friends and family, reflecting on the history associated with each area, and taking in the natural beauty and unique culture of each place—and doing this all with a focus on encountering God—promises to be rejuvenating.

This sabbatical comes at a good time. The past few years of ministry have been exhausting, given the pandemic, and the difficult work of trying to re-imagine Church both before and after the pandemic. It is also a good time for me to focus on my own health by establishing some patterns of daily movement that will hopefully extend beyond the sabbatical.

Rev. Bill Davnie, who has a long history with Trinity, will be covering at Trinity while I am away, including Sunday morning worship, moderating the Session, and being available for pastoral care needs and emergencies.

I look forward to the time away as a chance to grow spiritually, to have space to do some contemplative reflection, and simply to rest and breathe. I will be sharing more about the journey both before we leave and after we return. The send-off Sunday will be May 27th. It is a holiday weekend, but also Pentecost Sunday and our first Sunday of summer worship.

I am sharing all of this now, so we can get excited together!

Lenten Wednesday Meditation

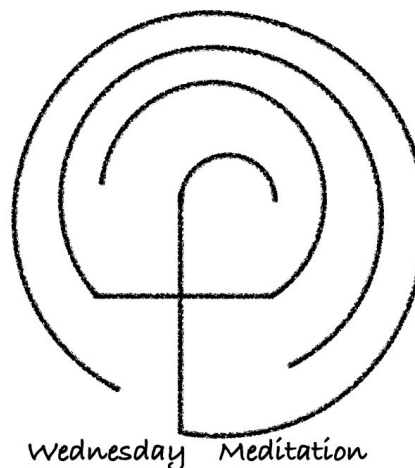
Sometimes we need to get out of our routine to get a perspective on our lives. It can be a holiday, a sick day, or a religious tradition like Lent.

No need to RSVP.

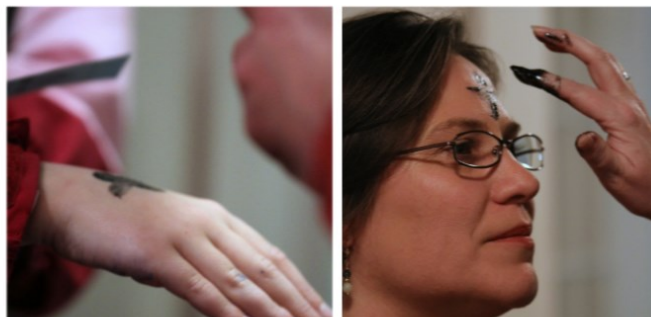

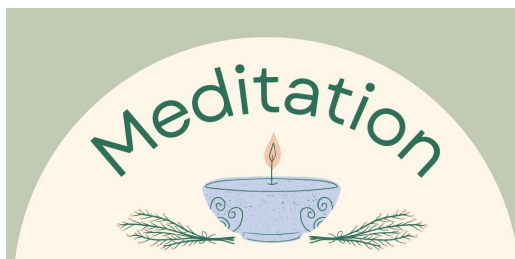

Good Friday—Tenebrae Service

Join us on Friday, April 7th at 7:30 p.m. for one of the most meaningful services of the year; the Tenebrae, which means "service of darkness," is an early Christian observance of the events of Jesus' passion. The service is a portrayal of the progression from light to darkness in the passion of Jesus, beginning with his betrayal on Thursday and concluding with his crucifixion and burial on Friday. After each reading, a candle will be extinguished, symbolizing the fading devotion of the disciples and the sin of the world. Following the final reading, the Christ candle appears to remind us that this is not the end of the story. Please note, childcare is not provided.

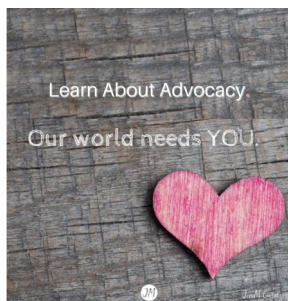

Carlisle Indian School Cemetery Trip

March 4th

Natalie & Tim Foley and the Racial Justice Ministry would like to invite you to join us on Saturday, March 4th to visit the Carlisle Indian School & Cemetery. This is a great chance to learn and experience a recent, pivotal chapter for Native Americans and our country and honor the 186 children who died while attending the school.

Why is this important?

As you may know, our nation has recently begun to spotlight & reconcile the dark history of the U.S. (& Canada) regarding boarding schools for native children. "Kill the Indian, Save the Man" was the anchor quote from the U.S. policy of assimilation of Native people in the 19th & 20th centuries. 350 government-funded and often church-run Indian Boarding schools appeared during that time. Indian children were forcibly abducted by government agents, sent to schools hundreds of miles away, and beaten, starved, or otherwise abused when they spoke their native languages. The Carlisle School was the first, and the experiment for, U.S. boarding schools.

Who can come?

Anyone! Please invite friends and family members who are interested. We are inviting a few other congregations we know who have been learning more about Native American history.

Details:

The trip is from 9am - 4pm, including traveling to and from Carlisle, PA which will be great fellowship time as we are hoping to carpool. We'll be hosted by Sandi who runs the Carlisle Indian School Project, the non-profit that maintains the cemetery and raises funds to help repatriate the remains of the children back to their familial and sacred burial grounds across the country.

Tunnel of Hope

A Tunnel of Hope

Trinity hosted a powerful and immersive performance of Martin Luther King's Letter from Birmingham Jail on Saturday evening, February 4th. Approximately 125 attendees came and saw the dramatic performance presented in the sanctuary by professional actors Stephen Horst and Sulmane Maigado, from the Church of the Resurrection in Washington, D.C. The performance was commissioned by the Church of the Resurrection and has been performed at many church along the East Coast. The performance was sponsored by Trinity's Racial Justice Ministry and the event was coordinated by Mary McClelland.

The performance was based on the letter MLK wrote while in jail in Birmingham, Alabama, after being arrested with others for leading mass protests against the city's segregation ordinances. While in jail, King read an open letter by eight local white clergymen who were concerned about the civil rights demonstrations taking place and criticized MLK and the movement for what they deemed impatience, and for choosing protest instead of legal challenges. King wrote his response to these so-called moderate white clergymen on the margins of newspapers smuggled into his cell and the letter was later published. The performance was a dramatic reading of the letter, considered to be one of the defining documents in the civil rights era. Soon after King was released, even larger protests took place, including children and teenagers, and Commissioner of Public Safety, "Bull" Connor, responded with fire hoses and snarling dogs – scenes that were published in newspapers around the world and gained sympathy for the protesters. Soon thereafter, President Kennedy announced his intention to introduce civil rights legislation, leading to the eventual Civil Rights Act of 1964 signed by President Johnson.

After the performance, Romana Campos and Ed Scholl moderated a talk-back session with the audience for feedback and questions. From the 45 min. discussion that ensued, it was obvious the performance made a powerful impact and good discussion resulted about the nature of the civil rights movement in the 60s, and contemporary struggles for justice, including how we as individuals, and as a Trinity community, can respond to the call.

Session Highlights /Photos

Session Highlights for January 2023

Following are highlights of the session's regular monthly meeting, held via Zoom on Tuesday, January 10. For more information, touch base with Pastor Judith, Clerk Jim Dykstra or any session member:

- Treasurer Carol Hart provided a mid-year financial update and a report on the annual stewardship campaign.
- Administration Ministry Chair Carolyn Offutt presented first reading of the terms of call for Rev. Judith Fulp-Eickstaedt
- Session heard from Luke Bultena, in his final year at Princeton Theological Seminary about his faith journey and path to becoming a pastor and agreed unanimously to receive him under the care of the Trinity session on his path to ordination.
- Session was given an update on the membership inventory project.
- Session discussed Trinity's Discernment Initiative. Rev. Judith Fulp-Eickstaedt said the ministries are moving forward to address the findings of the discernment process. A report will be provided at the March session meeting on steps being taken by ministries to follow up on recommendations.
- Elder Gillian McClelland, chair of the Nominating Committee, gave a report that the committee has begun the process of developing a slate of Elders, Trustees and Nominating Committee members for approval at the March 12 annual meeting.
- Session approved a motion from the Education and Nurture Ministry that came from the Trinity Pre-school Board regarding anticipated spring fundraising options.
- Session approved administration of the sacrament of baptism for Charlotte James Hanckel on Sunday, April 23, and for Eleanor Siobhan Hunn Johnson on Sunday, June 3.
- Rev. Fulp-Eickstaedt gave session an update on ongoing efforts to find replacements for departed youth director Stuart Mapes and church manager Mike Swineford.
- The staffing review task force gave a brief update on its work. It is consulting with church staff and ministry chairs for their perspective. The goal is to have the review completed by May 2023.
- Clerk Jim Dykstra reported that he is preparing the Annual Statistical Report, due to Presbytery by February 1.
- Elders Michelle Edwards and Donna Edwards were approved as elder commissioners to the January 24 Presbytery meeting.
- Rev. Fulp-Eickstaedt said she hopes to fill openings for ministry chairs soon.
- Rev. Fulp-Eickstaedt provided a brief report from the Covid Management Team.
- The Outreach Ministry reported it will hold a new member dinner on February 11 for those who have joined Trinity since shortly before the pandemic.
- The Racial Justice Ministry is planning a special event, Tunnel of Hope, in the Trinity sanctuary on February 4.
