Then Jesus said to him, "Today salvation has come to this house, because he, too, is a son of Abraham. For the Son of Man came to seek out and to save the lost."

Questions for Reflection

- 1. We sometimes imagine that we must earn God's love. In the story of Zacchaeus, however, Jesus offered companionship to him even before Zacchaeus made restoration to those he had cheated. Did he make amends as a requirement, or as the joyful response for receiving the love of Jeus? What makes "grace" grace?
- 2. Making amends is one of the steps of AA and other 12-step groups. However, making amends is only encouraged when doing so *will not cause further harm*. Why do you think that is an important caution?
- 3. Who have you harmed, intentionally or unintentionally? Are you able to make amends? What might that look like in your situation?

Operation Allies Welcome:

Resettling Afghans to the United States

Kemper Gay will provide an overview and share her own personal experiences of the large-scale effort to resettle Afghans in America. The Class will be in the **Lewis Room** on **November 2nd**.

Next Sunday, November 9th: Zoom with Daoud Nassar from the West Bank

During next Sunday's 10:10 Sunday School Hour, we will have the opportunity to have a Zoom connection with affiliate member Daoud Nassar, who lives in the West Bank and is the founder of the Tent of Nations, an organization that promotes peaceful solutions to conflict and hosts visitors from all over the world. Visitors come for peace-making conferences and to help work the land on the Nassar Farm, which is under constant threat. The family has been in a 35-year legal process to keep their land amid growing Israeli settlements surrounding the property.

Trinity members have visited the land and Daoud has visited Trinity many times. He and his wife Jihan decided to become affiliate members as they consider Trinity their church in the United States. This presentation will be like the zoom call held during the Trinity Fall Retreat. We hope you will join us.


Mental Health Blog: The "Great Flex"
